

There is growing pressure on the NHS drugs bill

Due to people living longer, more complex and innovative medicines being developed, and more specialist medicines being used





- Overall medicines spend 2016/17 was £17.4bn, an increase of 33.7% from £13bn in 2010/11
- Cost of medicines prescribed and dispensed in primary care rose from £8.6bn in 2010/11 to £9.0bn in 2016/17, a rise of 3.6%
- Cost of medicines used in hospitals increased from £4.2bn in 2010/11 to £8.3bn in 2016/17, a rise of 98.3%

- Exactly the same active ingredient and yields the same therapeutic effect
- Developed for marketing once the period of 'exclusivity' on the branded version has expired
- Any differences are limited to inactive ingredients, e.g. colouring, flavouring, and stabilizing agents

Clinician identifies suitable patient

Patient sees Pharmacist to switch Pharmacist follow up by telephone and delivery of medication
