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To test or not to test? That is the Question

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Aims


- Investigate nurses' knowledge and attitudes to HIV
- Identify associated background factors
- Explore attitudes of nurses regarding HIV testing of patients and staff

The Study

- Ethics and R&D approved February 2012
- 144 nurses completed an anonymous questionnaire
- 24 different countries of birth, 44% UK, 27% Africa
- Mean age 43.3 years, 93% female
- 67% qualified >10 years, 49% UK nursing <10 years
- 53% religion "very important"

Background

- HIV testing in HIV prevalence areas for GP practices and general medical admissions.
- Routinely offered for those at higher risk

Background


- North Middlesex Hospital
 - high HIV prevalence area
 - Haringey 6/1000
 - Enfield 4/1000
- HIV testing in AMU & AE since Sept 2010
- Rapid HIV testing kits, 4th generation HIV ab/ag tests

Background


- Lack of HIV knowledge
 - Stigmatizing attitudes & decrease in HIV testing
 - Competent nurses
- Department of Health guidelines 2007
 - Exposure Prone Procedures
 - New Healthcare workers
- Limited research in the UK on NHS staff testing
- Africa, high interest and informal self testing
 - Barriers include fear, stigma and job loss


Results

Who should be offered at HIV test on admission



I would like to self test anonymously using rapid HIV test kits Hospitals should supply rapid HIV kits for staff self testing





Discussion

- More accepting for testing higher risk patients
- Motives behind answers not known
- Lack of knowledge of HIV testing
- Nurses want to test for HIV
- Limitations of questions

Discussion

- Balancing reducing stigma and increasing testing in high risk groups
- Anonymous self-testing in reduction of stigma/discrimination/fear
- Universal offering HIV testing of healthcare staff and patients to reduce stigma
 - Financial restraints

WHO report on Self Testing in Africa

Pros

 Confidential, Convenient, Reduce Stigma, Autonomous, Resource reduced

Cons

 Accuracy, Pre and Post test info and referrals, Unethical use, Justification for sex

Recommendations

 More Research, Fixing the cons, Couples testing, Cost effectiveness, Benefits and Harms

Conclusion

- More training on HIV testing required for nurses
- Self testing was acceptable to a significant minority of nurses
- Further research needed
- Providing more opportunities increases HIV testing
- Knowing one's HIV risk factors and HIV status is important for all including nurses
