Why this project now?

- The 80s and 90s in HIV were a unique and profound era of British healthcare history
- The lived experience of HIV healthcare workers are stories that need to be told to both preserve those past experiences and to help inform future care, education and research
- Time is pressing we can't afford to lose that lived experience
- And lastly we successfully secured funding!

Some thoughts from HIV health workers

"It will enable healthcare workers to understand the experiences and context of the needs of long term survivors living with HIV for whom they are currently providing care"

"The impact of how we changed how nursing was delivered - the patient was truly the center of their care, what they wanted, how, when.....How we started to work more closely with the Voluntary Sector and address stigma and discrimination"



Oral history approach

- Contrast to anonymous, guided interview, destroyed once data obtained
- In-depth, free talking account using a 'life history' approach
- An opportunity for those people who have been 'hidden from history' to have their voices heard. Verbal account, the voice will tell the story in their own words not interpreted by someone else
- A source of new insights and perspectives that may challenge the traditional view of the past and formal historical accounts
- The ordinary/extraordinary story
- Preservation for use by future generations


The HIV/AIDS - oral history collections

- Invisible Women Positively Women Oral History Project 2007/8, a collection of 16 oral history interviews with women living with HIV.
- The Haemophilia and HIV Life History Project 30 oral history interviews patients with Haemophilia and HIV

The AIDS Era: an oral history of UK healthcare workers

- Interviews commence July 17th 2017 60 4-hour interviews over 12 months by 5 trained oral historians
- Healthcare professions doctors (20)/nurses (20)/allied HCWs(15)/'others' (5)
- HIV specialities adult/MSM/children/pregnancy/women/haemophiliac/drug use/black and ethics minorities
- Geographical spread
- Known figures and hidden stories
- Timed summary (searchable) and written transcript
- Archived British Library Sound Archive according to participants instructions (recording agreement and consent form) with on-line access
- Website/radio broadcast/theatre production by project group
