

HIV care in the community


- Has continued to evolve over the last eight years
- Increasing multiple complex health
 and social care issues
- Need for more care co-ordination, joint working and case management
- BHIVA standards cover 12 key themes, seen to be the most important issues for the care of people with HIV

Pathways of care



Sussex Beacon eligibility



- 1. Commencing or changing anti retroviral drug regimes, which are assessed to be unmanageable within the community
- 2. Requiring support around end of life care and palliative care
- 3. Clients with acquired brain injuries who may require a respite break for their themselves and their carers
- 4. Following hospitalisation for severe illness or surgery where they have an identified need for low-level clinical intervention/ rehabilitation that is unable to be met in the community.
- 5. Undergoing medical treatments for other illnesses e.g. Cancer or Hepatitis C

St Peters House



- 1. Community Support Workers: Benefits, housing, grants, employment, practical issues, immigration
- 2. Close relationships with other agencies Citizens Advice Bureau, local council etc
- 3. Patients are more vulnerable e.g. mental health, language issues, money management

THT

- Health Trainers Health maintenance, accessing services, health anxiety
- Positive Self Management
 Programme courses
- Joint visits with CNS complex cases

Mental Health

- Improved access to mental health and psychology
- Tiered approach in line with BHIVA Standards
- Increased involvement with GPs
- Multidisciplinary meetings
