- No student nurse placements
 - Historical concerns re confidentiality
 - Not enough learning experiences for 12 weeks





HIV Stigma & Education

- Traditional undergraduate nursing curriculum does not provide adequate preparation to care for patients living with HIV.
- Stigmatizing attitudes held by healthcare workers towards persons living with HIV are still commonplace
- Without education students may embark on their nursing careers with stigmatizing attitudes and a lack of HIV knowledge.
- Results show significant positive changes in student's attitudes and knowledge after a minor addition to the curriculum.





What we did

- Discussed with ward managers on ID wards
- Spoke with university placement coordinator
- Spoke with other CNS's and MDT
- Week long placement designed
- Worked with university and ward managers to arrange who comes when
 - 20 1st yr students
 - 9 2nd yr students
 - 2 3rd yr students
